GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Every student admitted to MAC shall adhere strictly to the following guideless and rules to maintain discipline and standard code of conduct.

- Students of Mar Augusthinose college are expected to report at the college sufficiently early for the classes, on reaching the college, they shall go to their respective class rooms or library and engage themselves in academic activity. They should not wander about the college or talk loudly disturbing others.
- 2. Every morning we begin our work with a Prayer song and end with the National Anthem. Staff and students shall come to attention when the song begins and keep standing till the end. Staff and students are expected to be in their classes before the prayer song begins.
- 3. Students are expected to stand when the teacher enters the classroom and wish him/her and remain standing till the teacher allow the students to sit down Rise again and say "Thank You sir/ mam when the teacher leaves the class room.
- 4. No student shall enter or leave the class room when the session is on without the permission of the teacher.
- Consumption of alcohol, drugs, tobacco etc. is strictly prohibited in the campus and in hostels. Any student found using such banned things shall be summarily dismissed from the college without enquiry.
- 6. Students are expected to spend their free hours in the library or study in their respective class rooms. They shall not loiter along the corridors or engage in noisy conversations that may disrupt the smooth working of the college.
- 7. Howling or hooting is not allowed within the campus
- 8. Students shall not enter class rooms other than his /her own without prior permission of the Principal/Vice Principal during class time or intervals.

- Disfiguring the walls, doors, windows, furniture, vehicles and other such things with graffiti, engravings etc is punishable with a fine that will duly be deducted from the Caution deposit of the guilty.
- 10. Students shall dress modestly and becomingly of a student. They shall wear the prescribed Uniform and ID card on all working days including special classes and examinations.
- 11. Hair style should be becoming of a gentleman. Therefore, no male students shall enter the college with haircut, cropped or grown long in the new gen way.
- 12. Any student who is persistently insubordinate, repeatedly or wilfully mischievous, or found of guilty of malpractice or fraudulence in examination or who in the opinion of the principal, is likely to have an unwholesome influence on his fellow students shall be removed from the rolls. The removal shall be with either permanent or temporary depending on the gravity of the crime.
- 13. Students shall not leave the college campus any time in between 09.30 a.m. to 12.30 pm and 1.15 p.m. to 3.15 pm without the permission of the Principal.
- 14. Mobile Phones and Cameras are not permitted inside the Campus. Students found with either of it will be punished with fine.
- 15. Students who are involved in any criminal offence will be removed from the rolls of the college instantly.
- 16. Political activism is strictly banned in the campus. Students are forbidden from organizing or attending political meetings. Violations of this rule will be treated as a serious act of discipline.
- 17. Photography within the campus is prohibited.
- 18. Students are not permitted to bring their vehicles into the campus at any occasion. The vehicles should be parked only at the allotted space.
- 19. Students who are charged with criminal offences or are under suspension will not be permitted to enter the premises of the college without the permission of the Principal.

- 20. Use of social media for damaging the reputation of the College, staff or anyone connected to the college will be treated as CIBER Crime and the matter will be stringently dealt with.
- 21. The Principal shall have the power to declare holiday for the college if he is satisfied that peaceful academic functioning of the college cannot be carried out.
- 22. No student shall stay in the campus after 4 pm without permission.

Student shall seek prior permission of the Principal:

- To conduct meetings in the College buildings or anywhere in the College premises
- To use Megaphone, loudspeakers etc. and posters, banners or boards to be put up on the campus.
- To publish matters in Newspapers, Magazines, Journals or Social media in the name of the College.
- □ Students who do not adhere to the rules will be punished.

ATTENDANCE

- Attendance will be marked at the beginning of each period by the teacher engaging the class. Late comers may be given or refused attendance for the period or marked late at the discretion of the teacher engaging the class. If a student is absent for one hour, it will be treated as absence for half a day and if his absence is for two or more hours will be treated as absent for the whole day.
- 2. A student absenting himself from the college even for a day should submit leave application to the principal duly countersigned by the parent, HoD and class teacher immediately after the return from his/her absence
- A student absenting himself without leave for more than ten consecutive days will his name removed from the rolls and he may be readmitted on payment of college dues in any.
- 4. Duty leave for physical education may be permitted. However, the maximum numbers of duties leave for sports and other such events are limited to 10% of the total number of working days.

5. Students having a minimum of 75% attendance only shall be permitted to register for the University Examination. Condo nation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of 2 times during the whole period of the programme may be granted by the University on valid grounds only at the recommendation of the Principal. Principal has the discretion to recommend or not to recommend a student for condonation. Those students who are not eligible for condonation can repeat the semester along with the next batch after obtaining readmission.

IDENTITY CARD AND UNIFORM

At the time of admission, the student will be provided with an identity card. The student must affix his/her signature on the card and get it attested by the Principal. Students are expected to carry the Identity cards with them while in the campus and produce them on demand for inspection by any member of the staff. Students coming without wearing ID cards will be fined Rs. 100/-. If the card is lost a duplicate card can be obtained on payment of Rs. 100/-.

Students should wear the prescribed uniform on all working days. This is to maintain discipline and instil a spirit of equality among them. Students coming without wearing Uniforms will be fined Rs.100/-

RESIDENCE OF STUDENTS

- 1. Students who do not live with their guardians should as a rule, reside in the college hostel local guardians or approved lodges. All female students who do not live with their parents are expected to reside in women's hostel. The warden shall be the sole authority in the management and day today administration of the hostel. She/he is appointed by the Manager, and all matters connected with the hostel will be dealt with by the warden and appeals may be made only to the Manager. They can however reside with their local guardians with the permission of the Manager.

- 2. Students who want to live in lodges must get the permission of the Principal before any lodge is chosen.
- 3. Students shall submit to the college office, in the prescribed form obtainable in the office, complete information regarding their residence
- 4. Any subsequent change in residence can be made only with the written permission of the Principal. A boarder who absents himself/herself from the classes without Bonafede reasons shall be asked to guit the hostel.
- 5. There are separate hostels for men and women. St. Paul's Hostel managed directly by the church is exclusively for men and Carmel Jyothi Hostel is run by Carmelite Sisters, accommodates only women. Dismissal from the hostel for grave misconduct will entail similar punishment in the college and punishment in the college for misconduct of boarders will entail similar punishment in the hostel also.
- 6. Students who reside in the college hostel are not permitted to contest in the college union election.

MAHATMA GANDHI UNIVERSITY STUDENTS' **CODE OF CONDUCT RULES - 2005**

1. Title

These rules shall be known as Mahatma Gandhi University Students' Code of Conduct Rules 2005. It shall come into force with immediate effect.

2. Object

These rules are framed with a view to maintaining and enforcing good conduct inside the class rooms and campus in the affiliated colleges, Departments of teaching and Research and self-financing schools of the Mahatma Gandhi University.

3. Application

These rules shall be applicable to all the affiliated colleges under the University, University departments of teaching and research and self-financing schools of the University.

4. Definitions

- 1. College: means a college as defined in Section 2(2) and Section 2(7) of the Mahatma Gandhi University Act, 1985.
- 2. Vice Chancellor: means the Vice Chancellor of the Mahatma Gandhi University.
- Student's Grievance Redressal Committee: Student's Grievance Redressal Committee constituted as per Rule 8 of these Rules.
- 4. Student: means a part- time or full- time student as defined in Section 2(26) of Mahatma Gandhi University Act, 1985.
- 5. Principal: means Head of College as defined in Section 2(16) of the Mahatma Gandhi University Act, 1985.
- 6. Political Activity: Political Activity means any act, activity or con duct by any student in a college by which political ideologies of any political party recognized by the Election Commission are preached, professed, imparted or disseminated by speeches, visible representation or other means of communication, whatsoever. In case of definitions not mentioned above, the definitions in the University Act and Statutes shall prevail.

PROHIBITION ON POLITICAL ACTIVITY INSIDE THE CAMPUS

- A. No student of a college shall get himself involved in any political activity by himself or any other activity carried on by fellow students inside the campus in any manner whatsoever and any such activity is hereby banned inside the campus.
- B. Taking part in any political activity by organizing students or to cause gathering inside the college campus for the purpose of doing any activity as defined in Rule 4(6) shall constitute serious

indiscipline. Every member of such a gathering shall be individually liable and responsible for the gross indiscipline in this regard and the Principal shall have the power to take disciplinary action against students who indulge in the aforesaid activities.

- C. It shall constitute gross indiscipline to call for and appeal to strike based on policies and ideologies that may be preached by political parties or their sister organizations or students wings. The participants in the strike as aforesaid shall be dealt with by the disciplinary authority and they shall be imposed appropriate punishment as provided in these rules.
- D. No student of the college shall stage or indulge in any activity like Dharna, Gherao, or obstructing entry to and from any class room, office, hall or other places inside the campus and such activities shall be treated as misconduct.
- E. No student shall shout slogans inside the class rooms, office or any other place inside the campus and obstruct and interfere or cause disturbance and nuisance to the normal functioning of the institution. These activities shall be treated as misconduct.

PROCEDURE FOR IMPOSITION OF PUNISHMENT

- 1. The Principal of the college shall be the disciplinary authority in respect of the students in the college.
- 2. If, it comes to the notice of the Principal that a student or a class or group of students have committed misconduct as referred to in Rule 5 above and that the Principal is convinced that there is prima facie reason in the allegation against the delinquent students, he shall immediately pass an order suspending the student/ students from the college. iii. If the Principal is satisfied that the delinquency alleged in the complaint requires further investigation/enquiry, he shall report the matter to the College Council. After reporting the matter and after seeking the views of the Council the Principal shall appoint a competent teacher/ teacher to enquire into the matter and to submit the report immediately.

- 3. The Enquiry Officer so appointed shall conduct enquiry without delay after gathering oral or written evidence from the complainant as well as the person against whom the allegations of delinquency, were made. The Enquiry Officer also shall give fair and reasonable opportunity to all the parties concerned and shall submit a report to the Principal without unnecessary delay. After the receipt of the report, the Principal shall consider the report and take appropriate action, which he deems fit, including the imposition of the following punishments.
 - a. Imposition of fine.
 - b. Issuance of compulsory transfer certificate.
 - c. Dismissal from the college

In the event of imposition of punishment of dismissal or compulsory issuance of transfer certificate, the Principal shall forward the order along with the report to the University.

PROHIBITION OF DAMAGE TO PROPERTY

The student shall not disfigure the class rooms, compound wall, or other buildings, inside the college campus by pasting posters or writing on the walls, in connection with any activity. They shall not damage or destroy any furniture, equipment and other materials inside the college campus. In the event of any student indulging in any such activity, a fine shall be imposed on him, which is to be fixed by the Principal of the College after evaluating the extent and magnitude of the damage so caused. The aforesaid imposition of fine is without prejudice to the liability of the delinquent student for prosecution under the provisions of the Indian Penal Code or under the Prevention of Damage to Public Properties Act. The damage so fixed by the Principal shall be recovered as arrears of land revenue and in the event of non-payment, the recovery proceedings shall be taken against the person responsible.

HIGH COURT ORDER PROHIBITING CAMPUS POLITICS

The Honourable High Court of Kerala has declared in the Mar Augusthinose College, Ramapuram Case Judgement dated 26-05-2003, that the educational institution has the right to prohibit political activities on the campus and forbid students from organizing or attending meetings other than the official ones within the College campus. The relevant part of Judgment is quoted below.

We are of the view that guideline (9) banning political activities within the campus and forbidding the students from organizing or attending meetings other than the official ones with the campus is not designed to prohibit any of the fundamental rights of the students guaranteed under Article 19 (1) (a) or 19 (1) (c). It is not a total prohibition of any fundamental right, but only a reasonable restriction confined to college campus and the code of conduct cannot be flouted in the name of any other freedom or the rights guaranteed under Article 19 (1) (a) or 19 (1) (c). Once students are admitted to an educational institution they are bound by the code of conduct laid down by he educational institutions through the prospectus or College calendar and it is implicit that they should observe the code of conduct necessary for the proper administration and management of the institution. Restrictions are only reasonable and designed to promote discipline in the educational institution so that the objectives of the educational institution could be achieved and the wisdom of laying down those restrictions cannot be challenged by the student after getting admitted to the educational institution. The right to admission not being absolute there could be regulatory measures for ensuring educational standards and maintaining excellence in education. Rules and made for maintaining discipline in the educational institution which is applicable equally to the management, teaching staff, non-teaching staff and the student community as a whole for its proper functioning. Clause 9 of the General Discipline laid down by Mar Augusthinose College, Ramapuram does not violate Article 19 (1) (a) or 19 (1) (c) of the Constitution of India and therefore liable to be upheld. In other words, those restrictions are for the proper functioning of the educational institution itself.

Election to the College Union is conducted on the parliamentary mode as per Para 6.2.4 of the J. M. Lyngdoh Commission Report and order passed by the Supreme Court of Indian in SLP No. 24295/2004. The college Union comprises a Students' general council and an executive. All students are members of the general council. To conduct the election to the Executive Council, an electoral council, an electoral council consisting of two elected representatives (1 Boy& 1 Girl) from each class will be formed. The electoral council will elect the executive committee consisting of the following office bearers: Chairman/person, Vice Chairman/chairperson, General Secretary, University Union Councillors (2), Magazine Editor and the Arts Club Secretary.

The college reserves the right to conduct the election to the College Union on any date which the college deems suitable for such an election as per the order of the High Court of Kerala.

THE COLLEGE LIBRARY

A. Working Hours

The library will be open from 9.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. on all days except Sundays and other College holidays. The issue/return counter works only up to 3.30 p.m. Saturdays will be maintenance days and no book will be issued/returned on those days.

B. General Rules

- 1. Students entering the Reading Room should produce their identity cards at the entrance on demand.
- 2. Personal articles like books, umbrellas, bags etc. should be kept at the entrance at places assigned for the purpose, before entering the library.
- 3. Strict silence should be observed in and around the Library.
- 4. Magazines and papers should not be removed from their places on the tables and stands. No mechanical reproduction or tracing of materials shall be made without the permission of the librarian.
- Books of reference illustrated and rare books, special books, multi volume collections, serial publications and periodicals will not be issued out. However, these may be consulted within the
library after making necessary entries in the reference register.

6. Members of the staff may borrow books after making the necessary entries and signing in the issue registers. Teachers may keep text books with them for the whole academic year. Other books (not more than 10 at a time at any rate) may be kept up to 30 days. However, all books borrowed from the library should be returned before 31st March every year.

C. Borrower Cards

Books are issued to students on borrower cards. Degree students will be issued 4 Cards each and P. G. students 5. As a rule, only one book will be issued on a single card. The reader must surrender his/ her card when a book is issued and take back the card when the book is returned. 1st year / semester students should apply for Borrower Cards in the prescribed form (available in the library) within 30 days of their admission. Tickets are issued for the duration of the course. On completion of the course, students should return their library cards by the dates fixed for the purpose, Borrower cards are not transferable. Students should submit in writing to the librarian, if their library card is lost. To replace a lost card a duplicate may be issued on payment of a penalty of Rs.50.

D. How to Borrow a Book

Students may refer to the catalogue, identify the books, and leave the details with the librarian, before 11 Am on all working days. The books can be collected from the librarian in the afternoon, on production of the identity cards. Before leaving the counter, the borrowers shall point out to the Librarian any damage or mutilation of the books they are taking. The Librarian will then make the necessary entries in the book and put his/her initials.

E. Returning the Book

It is the duty of the librarian and his staff to examine the books when they are returned by the borrowers. If mutilation, over writing removal of pages, or any damage detected, the librarian can take immediate action. The loan period is 14 days. But in special circumstances the Librarian can call back any book at any time from a reader, even

if the period of loan has not expired. Books issued will not be renewed. However, if there is no demand from any other person, the book may be reissued after it is returned. Delay in retuning a book after the due date will entail a fine of one rupee per day (Rounded to the next rupee in case of fraction of a rupee), of delay for each volume.

F. Damage to the Books

Borrowers will be responsible for the loss of or damage to the books taken out by them. Marking on books with pencil or ink, soiling them, causing defacement to pages or binding, underlining, writing remarks, etc. on pages, folding or tearing off pages, etc. will be held as serious charges. If a book belonging to a set or series is lost or damaged and a new volume is not separately available, the user will be required to replace the whole set or series. The damaged set or series may be returned to the person after making the re-placement. If a book is lost, it should be reported to the librarian immediately. He/she will decide if the book is to be replaced or paid for. If a book is not returned within one month after the due date, it will be considered lost. No member will be allowed to borrow books until the dues, if any, are cleared. If after the payment of the cost, a book lost or missing is recovered the library will not accept it. Books taken for reference/consultation need not be put back on the shelves by the readers themselves but may be handed over to the Assistant-in-charge.

All library arrears should be cleared by the students before they receive their Hall Tickets for University Examinations or before obtaining the T.C., in case they leave the college before the completion of the course.

CONDUCT CERTIFICATE AND TRANSFER CERTIFICATE

- 1. Application for Conduct Certificate and Transfer Certificate should be given as soon as possible after the student leaves the College.
- No student who has previously studied in any recognized school or college shall be admitted to the College unless she presents a Transfer Certificate.

- 3. Ordinarily a notice of 24 hours is necessary to issue a Certificate.
- 4. Application in the prescribed format should be given to the office in order to obtain the Transfer Certificate.

TRANSCRIPT AND LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION

Transcripts and letter of recommendation may be issued from the College, provided an application is given. A notice of three days is necessary for issuing Transcripts and letter of recommendation. A moderate fee will be levied.

There shall be three days semester break after odd semesters and two months' vacation during April and May in every academic year.

ASSIGNMENTS

Assignments are to be done from 1st to 4th semesters. At least one assignment should be done in each semester for all courses.

SEMINAR / VIVA

A student shall present a seminar in the 5th semester for each paper and appear for Viva-voce in the 6th semester for each course.

INTERNAL ASSESSMENT TEST PAPERS

Two test papers (one Internal and One Model exam) are to be conducted in each semester for each course. The evaluations of all components are to be published and are to be acknowledged by the candidates. All documents of internal assessments are to be kept in the college for one year and shall be made available for verification by the University. The responsibility of evaluating the internal assessment is vested on the teacher(s), who teaches the course.

EXTERNAL EXAMINATION

The external theory examination of all semesters shall be conducted by the University at the end of each semester. Students having a minimum of 75% average attendance for all the courses only can register for the examination. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of 2 times during the whole period of the programme may be granted by the University on valid grounds upon the recommendation of the Principal. The principal has the right to grant or deny condonation. This condonation shall not be counted for internal assessments. Benefit of attendance may be granted to students attending University/College union/ Co-curricular activities by treating them as present for the days of absence, on production of participation/attendance certificates, within one week, from competent authorities and endorsed by the head of the Institution. This is limited to a maximum of 10 Days per semester and this benefit shall be considered for internal assessment also. Those students who are not eligible even with condonation of shortage of attendance shall repeat the semester along with the next batch after obtaining readmission.

Regulations for Post Graduate Programmes (CSS) (2019 Admission Onwards)

EXTRACT OF RULES AND REGULATIONS

These Regulations shall be called Mahatma Gandhi University Regulations (2011) governing postgraduate programs under the credit semester system (MGU-CSS-PG) these regulations shall come into force from the academic year 2012-13 onwards. There will be 4 semesters of 90 working days with 18 academic weeks of 5 days each.

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

Students shall be admitted into postgraduate programme under the faculties. The programme shall include two types of courses, Programme Core (PC) courses and Programme Elective (PE) courses. There shall be a Programme Project (PP) with dissertation to be undertaken by all students. The programme will also include assignments, seminars/practical viva etc. if they are specified in the curriculum.

There shall be various groups of programme elective courses for a programme such as Group A, Group B, etc. for the choice of students subject to the availability of faculty and infrastructure in the institution and the selected group shall be the subject of specialization of the programme.

PROJECT WORK

Project Work shall be completed by working outside the regular teaching hours and carried out under the supervision of a teacher in the department concerned. A candidate may, however, in certain cases be permitted to work on the project in an industrial/research organization on the recommendation of the supervisor. There should be an internal assessment and external assessment for the project work. The external evaluation of the project work is followed by presentation of work including dissertation and viva-voce. The title and the credit with grade awarded for the programme project should be entered in the grade card issued by the University.

ASSIGNMENTS

Every student shall submit one assignment as an internal component for every course with weightage one. The topic for the assignment shall be allotted within the 6th week of instruction.

SEMINAR LECTURES

Every PG student shall deliver one seminar lecture as an internal component for every course with weightage two. The seminar lecture is expected to train the student in self-study, collection of relevant matter from books and Internet Resources, editing, document writing, typing and presentation.

CLASS TESTS

Every student shall undergo at least two class tests as an internal component for every course with weightage one each. The weighted average shall be taken for awarding the grade for class tests.

ATTENDANCE

- The minimum requirement of aggregate attendance during a semester for appearing the end semester examination shall be 75%. Condonation of shortage of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of postgraduate programme may be granted by the University.
- 2. If a student represents his/her institution, university, state or nation in sports, NCC, NSS or cultural or any other officially sponsored activities such as college union/university union activities, he/she shall be eligible to claim attendance for the actual number of days participated subject to maximum 10 days in a semester based on the specific recommendations of the Head of the department and Principal of the college concerned.
- 3. A student who does not satisfy the requirements of attendance shall not be permitted to take the end semester examinations.

EXAMINATIONS

- 1. There shall be university examination at the end of each semester.
- 2. Practical examinations shall be conducted by the university at the end of each semester
- Project evaluation and viva-voce shall be conducted at the end of the programme only. Practical examination, project evaluation and viva-voce shall be conducted by the two external examiners and one internal examiner.
- 4. End-Semester Examinations: The examinations shall normally be at the end of each semester.
- 5. There shall be one end-semester examination of 3 hours duration in each lecture-based course and practical course.
- 6. A question paper may contain short answer type/annotation, short essay type questions/problems and long essay type questions. Different types of questions shall have different weightage to quantify their range. Weightage can vary from course to course depending on their comparative importance, but a general pattern may be followed by the Board of Studies.

EVALUATION AND GRADING

Direct Grading: The direct grading for CE (Internal) and ESE(External Evaluation) shall be based on 6 letter grades (A+, A, B, C, D and E) with numerical values of 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 and 0 respectively.

Grade Point Average (GPA):Internal and External components are separately graded and the combined grade point with weightage 1 for internal and 3 for external shall be applied to calculate the Grade Point Average (GPA) of each course. Letter grade shall be assigned to each course based on the categorization provided in Pattern of Questions in page 59.

Internal evaluation for Regular programme: The internal evaluation shall be based on predetermined transparent system involving periodic written tests, assignments, seminars, lab skills, records, viva-voce etc.

Components of Internal (CE) and External Evaluation (ESE): Grades shall be given to the evaluation of theory / practical / project / com-

prehensive viva-voce and all internal evaluations are based on the Direct Grading System.

Proper guidelines shall be prepared by the BOS for evaluating the assignment, seminar, practical, project and comprehensive viva voce within the framework of the regulation.

There shall be no separate minimum grade point for internal evaluation

After the successful completion of a semester, **Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)** of a student in that semester is calculated using the formula given below.

SGPA (S_j) = $\sum (C_j x S_j) / \sum C_i$ (SGPA= Total credit Points awarded in a semester / Total credits of the semester)

Where 'S' is the j^{th} semester. 'G', is the grade point scored by the student in the i^{th} course. 'C' is the credit of the i^{th} course.

Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of a Programme is calculated using the formula:

 $CGPA = \sum (C1 \times S1) / \sum C_i$

(CGPA = Total credit points awarded in all semesters / Total credits of the programme)

Where 'C' is the credits for the i^{th} semester 'S' is the SGPA for the 1^{st} semester. The SGPA and CGPA shall be rounded off to 2 decimal points.

For the successful completion of semester, a student shall pass all courses and score a minimum SGPA of 2.0. However, a student is permitted to move to the next semester irrespective of her/his SGPA.
